# Transforming the African Narrative Through Philanthropy

#### **Context:**

Poverty, conflict, high youth unemployment, and governance issues are realities in Africa that sometimes make it difficult to see what else is happening, such as the increase in innovative start-ups, growth in fintech infrastructure, alternative energy solutions and healthcare advancements. Africans in the Diaspora are often also focused on the negatives rather than the opportunities these challenges present for investment.

Changing the narratives on Africa is a collaborative effort that should be intentional and strategic. Philanthropy can play an important role in catalyzing solutions. The 2023 Black Philanthropy Month (BPM) event organized in collaboration with Africa Diaspora Network and Afrigrants Foundation has convened a panel of experts for a conversation on this important theme.

In recent years, <u>Africa has seen</u> tremendous increases in private funding, resulting in rapid growth for technological advancement, educational resources, and economic growth. However, more philanthropic work is needed from an international and domestic perspective in order to ensure the continued development in Africa and for the continent's potential to be met.

It is no surprise that political struggles and violence pose major difficulties to smooth philanthropic action. With a wide variety of humanitarian concerns still at the forefront of attention, it is necessary to address these issues at a direct community level with sustainable financial plans to meet the goals of proposed solutions.

Philanthropy towards the continent has <u>resulted</u> in a growing middle class, providing an increase in the pool of actual and potential philanthropists. This is an important factor as it supports a model that encourages philanthropy from within, allowing for a more direct and inclusive approach to development in the continent. An important aspect of philanthropy is that it supports betterment in all aspects of life and society in Africa, addressing issues ranging from food security, to gender equality, and tech.

How do you contribute to changing the negative narratives on Africa? How can philanthropy and other forms of social investing invest in transforming "Brand Africa?" What are the key impediments to a positive global narrative on the African continent? The Diaspora are an important constituency in changing the narrative, what tangible ways can they contribute? How has the narrative of philanthropy in Africa changed over time? What role do philanthropists play in shaping the narrative of Africa? What changes are needed so philanthropy in Africa can operate within political instability and narrow the disparity gap? What are some best practices to keep Africans at the forefront of philanthropic giving?

# **Summary:**

- It will take all of us to make it happen: It is all of our responsibility to ensure that investment in Africa for Africa is well-executed and for the common good of society.
- Philanthropy is a small space, but it can catalyze things: Philanthropy in general, and even more so African Philanthropy, is an incredibly small space. However, philanthropy gets the ball rolling and starts the tough conversation for what society is most in need of.
- We are all philanthropists: Anyone and everyone can be a philanthropist. Most likely you have always been, giving back to the community in some way. Immigrants who come from Africa and start from scratch, have given back home to Africa no matter their circumstances. We can all lend a hand.

- Adaora Ikenze: "Social Media is the most catalytic tool in transformation for communication around communities. We have a responsibility to make sure it is used appropriately. When it comes to philanthropy, our "Made by Africa, Loved by the World" campaign focuses on small businesses, women, and communities, to ensure that they particularly have tools and resources to amplify their voices."
- **Kady Sylla:** "There is a diaspora philanthropy, and people in Africa or Africans abroad give because they are. However, there is no infrastructure except in maybe South Africa and Senegal, to systemically give back to the continent."
- Almaz Negash: "Whether we find ourselves in Africa or anywhere across the globe, securing funding remains a challenge. It's imperative that we exert our utmost efforts to foster inclusive growth for all."
- Thelma Ekiyor: "There are only a few of us in the decision-making room and those
  of us that are there are usually the minority voice or completely mute. I am tired of
  fighting. Having to consistently fight to make the case for Africa is tiring."
- **Dr. Camaren Peter:** "What I learned is that you have to prepare the ground, waiting for the moment, and then when you get the opportunity to make transformative change, you grab it. Revolutions don't just happen, they see it lying in the street before it unfolds."
- Dr. Jackie Bouvier Copeland: "In the diaspora, we do have the infrastructure to model the kinds of capital systems and economic justice that we envision. I'd encourage everyone to talk about how we can pool resources among our organizations to make a difference. To make real the improved capital access."
