SILICON VALLEY, CA – The African Diaspora Network (ADN) has introduced the third cohort of its Accelerating Black Leadership and Entrepreneurship (ABLE) program, intentionally developed to propel the growth of Black entrepreneurs and businesses throughout the United States. In response to a stark and concerning disparity, where Black startups receive a mere one percent of venture capital funding – with Black women-led startups facing even greater hurdles – ADN has been working in recent years to raise awareness and drive tangible change. Through the ABLE program, ADN delivers training, mentorship, and access to funding opportunities for Black entrepreneurs.

The third ABLE cohort represents a diverse spectrum of sectors, including education, healthcare, finance, renewable energy, and connectivity. Each of these sectors plays a pivotal role in addressing critical needs within the Black community while simultaneously fostering sustainable global progress.
